
Victory At Yorktown

n September 28, 1781, the battle was joined. This was to be the battle that would determine whether a nation, conceived in Liberty, would ever be born. On October 19, 1781, exactly 240 years ago, it was almost assured. British forces commanded by Lieutenant General Charles Cornwallis surrendered to the combined American and French forces under the command of General George Washington. member Gerry Miller; his wife, Charlotte Miller; and good friend Mike Arnold

I thought I would share with you the account of the actual event that resulted is these awards.

Those who have known Gerry for years know that he tries to be prepared for anything whether it be work, backpacking, being a volunteer firefighter and now being a member of the Lyon County Sheriff's Search and Rescue team/Lyon County Amateur Radio Emergency Service. Last year all of that preparedness paid off for one lucky ladv.

On Friday Aug 14, 2020, Gerry Miller, Charlotte Miller and Mike Arnold drove to watch a portion of the Vegas to Reno Off-Road race. The temperature that day was nearly

cerned for her parents and crew, and scared from being stranded there for six hours without anyone coming to her aid. Charlotte did an excellent job of keeping her warm, fed, given plenty of fluids as they drove to find a location where either the race radio or cell phone would work. The temperature at that time was around 58 degrees, so the rider was on hypothermia's doorstep. They got in touch with her parents who were relieved to hear from their daughter who

should have finished hours earlier. The Race Director told Gerry to remain in place and that he would send someone to recover the bike and lead the group out. After about 2+ hours, the fellow showed up with the bike on the trailer. Being old fire eaters, Gerry and Mike made sure the patient stayed conscious and was stabilized.

About 4+ hours, they made it to the finish line after putting Gerry's stock 2008 Toyota Tundra through hell; as Gerry said, "no way would I have driven through places we went; except we were bringing out a young women who was depending on a rider notification system that failed twice and the transponder on her bike failed to garner any attention after being in the same place for six hours.' You should know, the patient survived and is doing well.

merica is at a tipping point, when the preservation of our nation's history is more important than ever. For many decades, various heritage societies have focused their energies on their individual mission statements related to the historical settings peculiar to those societies, be it the Pilgrims, colonial New Netherland, England, New Jamestown, or other areas of early American history.

Traditionally, these societies have operated independently, with little coordination or collaboration. Members of these societies have taken it for granted, perhaps, that their traditions will carry on, and that younger generations of Americans will continue to preserve and protect our nation's heritage. That concept is threatened, however, from several

directions. A major threat comes from our nation's colleges and secondary schools, which teach students that America's history is a story of oppression, racism and privilege. Sadly, our children are not being taught the basic facts about the settlement of this country, the Revolution that made this a nation of free people, or the courage and sacrifices of generations of Americans to make us the greatest nation on earth.

It is with this in mind that American Heritage Partners has been formed. AHP is a Nevada-based 501 (c)(3) non-profit organization whose mission is to bring together the leading heritage societies and institutions to better educate and inform our citizens about our American history—its beginnings, its

challenges, and its glories. Towards that end, AHP intends to serve as a coordinating "hub" for organizations and other interested parties to come together to teach American history to our citizens, young and old, with appropriate funding and resources to be made available for these purposes. addition to live educational programs and activities, AHP's goal is to help these organizations exploit newer communications technologies, especially social media, in order to tell our American story in a more robust way, and to reach beyond the traditional audiences our heritage societies typically reach. AHP hopes to help these organizations gain a wider audience, and present our national story in a more collaborative way.
